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TRINITY

'sing the term Trinity in New Orleans will likely bring up cooking images, like making a roux with onions, celery, and bell peppers. But this is also a religious city, and thoughts also go toward the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In Jung's essay, "A Psychological Approach to the Trinity," we see how deeply his research into the psyche reaches. In addition to fluency in Latin and Greek, his knowledge of mythology includes works of the oral tradition from cultures not yet literate, from Babylonian god-triads, and Egyptian and Greek prefigurations of the Trinity. We learn that the Christian dogma of the Holy Trinity, that was debated for 400 years in the early church before adopted as dogma, is, from Jung's point of view, an archetype in the history of religion.

Jung hypothesizes that the evidence of pre-historic archetypal imagery – three figures in relationship – is what allows him to discuss these thoughts as psychology, not metaphysics. The image of God as a Trinity is complicated with another archetype, the archetype of wholeness, the quaternity. There the metaphysical problems of evil and the feminine, as fourths, come into play.

Jung says that the fact that the symbolism of these universal archetypes was regarded as a valid statement for two thousand years by millions of people gives them a high degree of validity. While that may satisfy ideas about metaphysical issues, like the qualities of God, they cannot be said to be true as facts in the material world. In practical life we cannot take truth by faith, but we must see reasons and actual meaning to know what is real and true.

These issues come alive today as we consider where our appreciation for Truth, Veritas, Pravda is taking us. The tendency for many people to be willing to lie to promote themselves--or facts--has never been so acceptable by the majority. Authorities that we used to trust as giving us the true facts have become corrupt and able to be manipulated by social and financial influences. Is there an archetypal tendency to Truth? Will it prevail to rescue our current public perception of reality? Can we count on having a community built on real facts? If not, we may never be able to trust a source of information or be able to be secure as a community. The social fabric must not unravel.

Image or Art?

Jungian Art Therapy, Trauma, and Cultivating a Relationship with the Unconscious

Presenter: Nora Swan-Foster, Jungian Analyst and Author of Jungian Art Therapy

Jungian Art Therapy was written as an invitation to those students of Jung who wished to explore his ideas and concepts through the image with its applications for various challenges, including trauma. In this presentation I will explore Jung's view that "psyche is image," and that his notion of "the third thing" is integral to Jungian art therapy. While working in his Red Book, Jung's use of art materials provided a deliberate and active alchemical engagement with the material world that opened the gates for the unconscious, for dialogues with inner figures, and to reconnect with the unfolding of his soul. Hidden behind these powerful images we discover Jung's deep intimacy with the unconscious that grew out of tormented confrontations, grief and loss, his need for individuation, and his relationship to ancient and prophetic mysteries.

Nora Swan-Foster, MA, ATR-BC, LPC, NCPsyA, is an art psychotherapist and Jungian analyst in Boulder, Colorado. She is a teaching member of the Graduate Art Therapy Program at Naropa University, is a training and supervising analyst with the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts (IRSJA), and is a member of the IAAP. She is the former North American editor for the Journal of Analytical Psychology and has published two books: Jungian Art Therapy (2018) and Art Therapy and Childbearing.

Trauma and the Transcendent Function

Presenter: Erik Goodwyn, MD, Psychiatrist and Author

What are the precise mechanisms of the transcendent function? Jung described the transcendent function in very broad, impressionistic terms; however, he was unable to draw upon the empirical research available today to more fully characterize this function. Reviewing more recent empirical research on the brain and mind, as applied to clinical material and situated within a depth psychology context, however, provides greater precision and clarity of this function. Applying these empirical sciences to a clinical context reveals that a major aspect of the transcendent function is affectively directed meaning-making. In this lecture we will explore how the transcendent function works, with a particular focus on trauma and the natural healing process that is facilitated by psychotherapy.

Erik Goodwyn, MD, is an Attending Physician at Eastern State Hospital in Lexington, Ky, Clinical Faculty at University of Kentucky, Clinical Associate Professor at the Billings Clinic, part of the WWAMI University of Washington School of Medicine--Billings Montana affiliate, Department of Psychiatry, and Adjunct Professor for University of Louisville, Department of Psychiatry. He has authored numerous publications in the field of consciousness studies, Jungian psychology, neuroscience, mythology, philosophy, anthropology, and the psychology of religion. He is

co-editor-in-chief of the International Journal of Jungian Studies, and his published books include: The Neurobiology of the Gods: How the Brain Shapes the Recurrent Imagery of Myth and Dreams (Routledge, 2012), A Psychological Reading of the Anglo-Saxon Poem Beowulf: Understanding Everything as Story (Mellen, 2014), Healing Symbols in Psychotherapy: a Ritual Approach (Routledge, 2016), Magical Consciousness, co-authored with anthropologist Susan Greenwood (Routledge, 2017), Understanding Dreams and Other Spontaneous Images: the Invisible Storyteller (Routledge, 2018 – Finalist in the 2019 International Association for Jungian Studies Book Award), and Archetypal Ontology, with philosopher and psychoanalyst Jon Mills (Routledge, 2023).

Jung's Genius Discoveries about Dreams


Presenter: Michael Vannoy Adams, Jungian Analyst

Freud was wrong about dreams; Jung was right about dreams. It's that simple, and it's that important. Michael Vannoy Adams, who last addressed the Jung Society of New Orleans in 2003, will discuss the mystery of why humans dream. He will demonstrate how Jung, not Freud, was the scientist who, in an act of genius, discovered the true purpose and evolutionary value of dreaming and the proper technique to interpret accurately what the images in dreams mean in order radically to transform and expand consciousness. The gist of Jung's position is that dreams do not conceal (as Freud alleges) but, in fact, reveal with exquisite clarity exactly what they mean when individuals apply Jung's principles of interpretation. This speaker will present vivid examples from contemporary dreams to illustrate Jung's revolutionary theory and method.

Michael Vannoy Adams, D.Phil, LCSW, is an internationally prominent Jungian psychoanalyst with a special interest in images and the imagination. He is a clinical associate professor at the New York University Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis and a member of the Jungian Psychoanalytic Association. He is the author of four books: For Love of the Imagination, The Fantasy Principle, The Mythological Unconscious, and The Multicultural Imagination: "Race," Color, and the Unconscious. He is the recipient of four Gradiva Awards from the National Association for the Advancement of Psychoanalysis. He is a Marshall scholar.

The Transformative Process of Barrel-Fired Ceramics

Alchemical Explorations in Arts-Based Research

As a Jungian Analytic candidate in training, I am familiar with both the importance of the creative process in psychological transformations as well as the use of alchemy as a metaphor for that process. In recent years I have also become interested in Arts-Based Research. These interests converged for me in my practice of the alternative ceramic firing technique known as barrel firing. The development of my practice of ceramics has been a formative experience in my understanding of myself not just as a clinician, but also as an ontological 'being-in-the-world'. From the perspective of a maker, I view myself more as an experimenter or investigator, rather than an artist. My goal is not to create an aesthetic object but to participate in an experience of the relationship with the material and the environment present during its creation. In this way I have come to understand the vessels I create as a concrete manifestation of moments within a process of coming into being.

Sarah Shelton, MS, LPC-S, NCC has been a practicing therapist for the past fifteen years and is a training candidate with the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts. During the training process, she became interested in alternative firing techniques and their resonance with the metaphor of alchemy and emergent theory and is currently writing her training thesis on this topic. She enjoys the rich interplay between the various communities she belongs to which combine her interests in ceramics, music, philosophy, gardening, and Jungian studies. She maintains a private practice (located above a ceramic studio) with a Jungian focus in New Orleans.
